# Llanidloes Postal bus service

The following pages tell an incomplete story of Britains first Mail Bus service, (Officially referred to by the Post Office as Postal Bus) These are items scavenged from my own collection of material, together with a couple of contributions from Hugh Johnson.

#### BRITAIN'S FIRST MAILBUS

By Hugh Johnson

Tourists exploring one of the remoter parts of Montgomeryshire are often surprised at the form of transport used by the local inhabitants.

Strolling up a quiet farm track one is quite likely to be confronted by a Mail Van with a difference - this one has windows in the sides and carries passengers. It is Britain's first Mailbus which combines the delivery and collection of mail with the carriage of fare-paying passengers.

The service was inaugurated on February 20th 1967 and at present carries an average of 30 passengers per week. It is one of eight experimental services and the only example at present operating in Wales. \*(Note 1).

This vehicle has been specially adapted with a Mail Locker built into the rear and carries up to 7 passengers. It belongs to and is operated by the Post Office and is regularly used during the summer months by tourists and campers.

The locals rely on this as their only form of regular transport to Lisnidioes or Liangurig and use it most days of the week throughout the year (A normal bus service only operates in this part of Montgomeryshire on Saturdays).

A total of 45 miles is covered on the morning run and 33 miles in the afternoon, the latter being quicker because no delivery is made - Mail is only collected from Post Offices and letterboxes.

During the morning run the postman delivers mail to a number of isolated farms and homesteads (in some cases opening and shutting 2 or 3 gates in the process) sells stamps and collects any mail for posting. Farms may be several miles from the nearest pillarbox or Post Office so the postman provides their main link with the outside world.

There is no Posting Box on the side of the bus and no handstamping is done 'en route'. All mail is taken by the postman/driver into Llanidloes Post Office and thence by mailvan to nearby Newtown, where it is cancelled with the LLANIDLOES die on the Newtown Cancelling, Machine. \*(Note 2). It is then despatched by rail to Shrewsbury for sorting and onward despatch.

A set of fare tables, a current timetable and a route map are illustrated below.




This is the earliest time table that I could find, and is listing times from 2nd.October 1967. Note that the Llidiarty-waen run is only operated in the evenings, and also that it is an experimental service. The price of a return journey ticket was Two shillings, eleven pence, which is approximately £ 2.60p. Today



The first post bus between Llanidloes and Llangurig had seven passengers, and was driven by postman Stanley Owen. I have a large number of the Courier, a Royal Mail magazine and this is a cutting from the March 1967 edition. Unfortunately I do not have page 9 which is referred to in the caption.








Fred Jones, one of the Llanidloes post bus drivers, was a very good friend, and help to me. For several years in the 60,s I had a "Tropical fish" shop in Great Oak street, just below J.K.Morgan. Fred helped me in the shop, and also helped me to install fish tanks for customers. Knowing of my interest in Philately he supplied me with Post office material of all description, including Stamp posters. Internal Post office posters, Bag tags, Order sheets, Post office manuals, Post Office courier magazines, anything that was available. These fill several large boxes. The Stamp Posters going back as far as 1969 are specially interesting to me because they closely tie in with my comprehensive collection of commemorative stamps. I must mention here, that another good friend, Roger Hales was even more helpful in my "Tropical fish" shop.



These timetables Illustrate just how basic the Post Bus service was operated, hardly surprising since early timetables describe the service as experimental. Note that in the later version Llwyn-yr—Hyddod has been correctly located.

POSTBUS TICKETS IN WALES

The Post Office's first ever Postbus was inaugurated in Wales on 20 January 1967 between the villages of Llanidloes and Llangurig in Powys. Later that year the service was extended to run both sides of the River Wye.

Throughout the history of this Postbus a ticket machine has been used. Between 1967 and 15 February 1971 - decimalisation day - a Mycalex machine was used but for the new money the machine was changed to an Almex which has been in use ever since. (Samples of the tickets are shown as Item A and Item B in the attached folder).

The Mycalex ticket measured 32" x 12" (95mm x 37mm) and was printed on one side only in English, giving details of date, fare paid, stage boarded, a four digit serial number and the logo "Issued subject to the Published Rules and Regulations" and "Post Office".

The Almex ticket whilst bearing the same logo as its predecessor also states the ticket, which measures 1 9/16" x 15" (40mm x 45mm), is "Not Transferable". This ticket is printed in English only on side with information relating to date, fare paid, three digit serial number and machine number. The value of Postbus tickets to collectors (Peridromophalists) was not appreciated and no special issue of tickets for Llandloes-Llangurig Postbus has ever been undertaken.

However, with the introduction of further Postbuses into Wales and an awareness that people study and collect tickets, opportunity has been taken to provide collectors with a new source of material.

The Wales and the Marches Postal Board under the Chairmanship of Mr Gerry McMorran, have decided that all Postbus tickets in Wales will have postage stamps affixed to relate to the value of the fare and those will be cancelled with a route personalised undated rubber stamp at the time of issue.

The basic ticket is white, measuring  $3\frac{\pi}{4}$ " x  $1\frac{\pi}{2}$ " (96mm x 39mm). On the face "Bws y Post Brenhinol - Royal Mail Bus" appears in 1/8" (3mm) red block lettering whilst to the left are a pair of crossed Posthorns and to the right of these are cornered vertical rectangles to locate three postage stamps. On the reverse again in 1/8" (3mm) red block lettering appears "Issued subject to Regulations contained in Official Notices" and the Welsh translation - which has precedence over the English - "Rhior yn unol a Rheolau a Gynhwysir mewn Hysbysiadau Swyddogol". (A sample of the blank ticket appears at Item C in the sample folder).

The second Postbus in Wales was inaugurated on 18 July 1977 at Llandovery, Dyfed and the service comprises part of a Welsh Office Rural Transport experiment.

For the first day services a special dated bilingual commemorative rubber hand stamp was used to cancel the postage stamps on the tickets. The Commemorative handstamp read:-

"Gwasaneth Bws y Post Brenhinol
Taith Gyntaf
Llandovery - Cilyowm-RhandirmwynMyddfai
18.7.1977
First Journey
Royal Mail Bus Service"

and measured 15/16" high x 1.13/16" wide (23mm x 46mm).

For the first 4 months a general cancellation stamp was used which read

"Bws y Post Brenhinol - Royal Mail Bus" and measured 1.3/8" x 1" (35mm x 7mm)

but on 28 November 1977 the currently used route personalised cancellation

stamp was introduced. This stamp read:-

"Bws y Post Brenhinol Royal Mail Bus Llandovery-Cilyowm-Rhandirmwyn-Myddfai"

and measures 1.7/16" x 2" (37mm x 12mm).

The latest Welsh Postbus - the third - based at Rhyl was inaugurated on 31 October 1977 in conjunction with the Clwyd County Council. The tickets are similar to those in use on the Llandovery Postbus and again a commemorative handstamp was used for the First Day services. This stamp read:-

"Gwasaneth Bws y Post Brenhinol
Taith Gyntaf
Rhyl-Meriadog-Rhyl
31.10.1977
First Journey
Royal Mail Bus Service"

and measured 1.15/16" wide x 15/16" high (49mm x 23mm). The daily cancellation stamp reads:-

"Bws y Post Brenhinol Royal Mail Bus Khyl-Meriadog-Khyl"

and measures 1.7/16" wide  $x \frac{1}{2}$ " wide (37mm x 12mm).

The cancellation stamps are made by means of a Printy self-inking machine manufactured by Trodat.

As stated earlier, all Postbus tickets to be issued within Wales and the Marches will have postage stamps amounting to the appropriate fare value affixed. In Wales a bilingual version will be used while, for the Marches, an English only style will be adopted though the ticket will remain the same size. The tickets

are issued from a ticket holder - known as a "mousetrap" - which has several spring-clips to hold the varying value of the tickets. These holders are made in Cardiff by a small general contractor to suit the number of fares required for each service.

The introduction of route personalised cancellation stamps has proved to be a financial success, having entered a ready market of transport and transport ticket enthusiasts who are keen to add to their collections. This policy will continue throughout the area controlled by the Wales and the Marches Postal Board.
